<u>He inoa: Nāhululeihiwakuipapa</u> - *The name given to the aspiring professionals of this field.*

The feather lei is the garment of divine aloha and symbol of protection for our natural environment. The feathers which make up the lei are sacred gifts from $n\bar{a}$ manu Hawai'i, those creatures which soar through the heavens and serve as a link between the Divine Creator and man.

The **Leihulu**, feather lei, made by **Kuipapa**. It is the style where new feathers manifested by Akua are perfected for placement by man and arranged in the pattern designed by Akua.

We shall be compared to the feathers of the lei. And let our mindset and work string us together (kui) and be reflective of the good training we've had and that we will provide in the future. May we help the Lei Maker (Akua) design a future for Hawai'i that will please the ancestors, create health, peace and balance for the people (feathers) who will follow us for seven generations. May our lei be the symbol of protection for our natural world and bind our spirits together.

Nāhululeihiwakuipapa Mo'okū'auhau

The origins of the Nāhulueihiwakuipapa subcommittee can be found in the work of collaborative efforts between UH Hilo, Hawai'i Conservation Alliance (the Alliance) members and other community organizations who had focused efforts on developing innovative internship and leadership development programs for Hawai'i's local youth. Realizing that a critical component of effective conservation in Hawai'i was the development of career pathways and networks for local professionals connected to Hawai'i's natural and cultural resources, conservation leaders partnered with the Alliance to bring together a focused alliance effort to support collaborative Next Generation initiatives. The University of Hawai'i's at Hilo's Pacific Internship Programs for Exploring Science (PIPES) led the formation of the inaugural Alliance Nāhululeihiwakuipapa group and since 2008 the subcommittee has grown to include membership from 11 non-profit, government, and university organizations.

Mission

We will cultivate and model conservation leadership in Hawai'i using trans-disciplinary strategies, generational bridging, and Hawaiian values and practices to support the growth of future generations of environmental stewards.

Vision

Hawai'i's conservation field is made up of individuals with diverse backgrounds and strong foundations in Hawaiian values and practices who lead by example to empower and work within various communities to restore and perpetuate the natural resources and cultural practices placed in our care.

Hawai'i Conservation Conference (HCC)

HCC Abstract Mentoring

2021 pilot program that aims to provide students and emerging professionals who are submitting an abstract to HCC with extra support on honing their abstract writing skills. Mentees are paired with Abstract Mentors who review the Mentee's abstract and provide constructive feedback utilizing the Conference Abstract Evaluation Criteria, prior to the official deadline to submit an abstract.

HCC (Hau'oli Mau Loa) Student/Emerging Professional Scholarship Program

In partnership with Hau'oli Mau Loa Foundation's Environmental Leadership Pathways Initiative, this registration incentive aims to provide a one-of-a-kind career development opportunity for students/emerging professionals interested in pursuing a career in a conservation-related field. Over the years, the program has grown to include high school students, undergraduate, graduate students, emerging professionals (no more than 3 years into their career) across the Hawaiian Islands. Scholarship recipients will receive a three-day registration to HCC which is inclusive of access to all HCC sessions (during and after), exhibit hall, and conference materials at a highly discounted rate via a registration discount code.

HCC Next Gen Journey

A document that provides suggested Conference presentations that students and emerging professionals should attend during HCC. It also contains a few tips and advice about how to attend Conference, network and find opportunities.

HCC Pūlama Kuamo'o Mentorship Program (expanded beyond HCC)

Student Scholarship & Emerging Professional Scholarship recipients are eligible to apply for the Pūlama Kuamo'o Mentorship Program. The intention of this program is to provide an opportunity for students & emerging professionals (Mentees) from Hawai'i to meet and network with Hawai'i's established professionals (Mentors) in the conservation research and natural resource management community. Mentees and Mentors are expected to participate in program expectations (connect prior to HCC, Meet & Greet Luncheon, attend 2 HCC presentations together, take a photo together, and Mentor introduce Mentee to 2 colleagues).

HCC Nāhululeihiwakuipapa Emerging Professionals Workshop

Held annually at HCC, this workshop that provides emerging professionals and students an opportunity to develop technical, networking and leadership skills critical for career, community, and personal success. Workshop topics are selected based on the interests and needs indicated on surveys taken by emerging professionals and students. Our goal is to empower workshop participants to lead from where they are, by providing them the opportunity to put learned skills into practice.

HCC Student Awards

Student Presentations submitted to HCC will be considered for our Student Awards Program. Awards are given out based on scoring by volunteer judges attending Conference. Students are scored according to creative ability, scientific procedures, thoroughness, competence, and communication. Prizes are awarded to the top two (2) student presentations in the following categories (Graduate Students: Oral, Poster, and Speed Talk presentations; Undergraduate Students: Oral, Poster, and Speed Talk presentations). Award winners will receive a cash prize as well as a Hawai'i Conservation Alliance hosted 'brown bag session' to further connect with established professionals and share about their research/project.

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Conservation Career Compass/Conservation Connections

Conservation Connections & Conservation Career Compass database scoping, revitalization, and branding

An effort to rebuild and merge Conservation Connections and Conservation Career Compass, due to Conservation Connections' database being outdated. The rebuild will make the websites simpler and easier to use for target audience. Plans for branding and roll-out need to be developed in order for this resource to be the go to place for students/emerging professionals looking for conservation opportunities.

Conservation Career Compass

Developed in 2017, the sister site to Conservation Connections, focuses on the steppingstones needed to be successful in obtaining a career on conservation. It provides listings of various academic programs, scholarships, fellowships, internships, and volunteering. Uniquely, the website houses Navigator Spotlights (video and written interviews with current conservationists in Hawai'i who share their story and journey in the conservation field and give advice to the next generation. In addition, through blog style articles on the Career Guidance page, we offer tips on topics such as interviewing, applying for a job, resume writing, specific professional/personal development and more.

Conservation Career Development Youth Presentations

Conservation Career Development presentations are provided to high school (8th grade and above) and college students to give an overview of the conservation career field pros,

cons, possible jobs, advice on next steps to begin looking into a conservation career, upcoming opportunities, as well as links to HCA resources such as Conservation Connections & Conservation Career Compass. Most presentations involve having guest speakers (current conservation professionals from various organizations) sharing about their work in conservation, how they got to where they are today, advice for students, and opportunities available at their organization.

Conservation Connections

Developed in 2013, Conservation Connections is a one-stop shop for students, professionals, the conservation community, and the broader Hawai'i community to find environmental stewardship opportunities across the Hawaiian Islands. It provides realtime opportunities being posted by the 200 plus organizations who have created a profile on Conservation Connections. Opportunities include volunteering, jobs (part-time and full-time), internships, and events. It is also a good resource to find a directory of conservation organizations across Hawai'i.
