
1978 Proposed Amendments

Delegates from the 1978 convention approved 34 constitutional amendments and voters later ratified all of them. <u>Click here for a full list.</u> A few highlights:

- Amendment 3 enshrined the right to privacy
- Amendment 16 gave counties the exclusive power to levy property taxes
- Amendment 22 established the state Water Commission
- Amendment 28 created the Office of Hawaiian Affairs
- Amendment 31 enshrined Hawaii's state motto and the Hawaiian language

INFORMAL PROCESS

- Any engagement outside of the official government policy pathway/process
- To raise awareness/visibility to an issue
- Provides opportunities for mass communicating
- Non-profits + For-profit organizations dedicated to informal and/or formal approaches





FORMAL PROCESS

- Executive/President **Federal**
 - Legislative Body

- Any engagement within official government policy pathway/process
- To forward an issue or slate agenda
- Provides <u>structured</u> approach for masses to communicate
- Structure is supported by taxpayers
- Advocacy provided by nonprofit and for-profit organizations



POLITICAL TERMS

Administration – management in or of government (all levels)

Government – the political direction and control exercised over the actions of the members, citizens, or inhabitants of communities, societies, and states; direction of the affairs of a state, community, etc.; political administration

Policy – a course or principle of action adopted or proposed by a government, party, business, or individual.

Sovereignty – the full right and power of governing body over itself, without interference from outside sources or bodies


LEVELS OF LEGISLATIVE GOVERNMENT

Citizenry recognition comes with civil, political, and social rights that are not afforded non-citizens.

Elects executive + legislative bodies at National and State level, as well as council members at County level.

Advocates for ideals at all levels has the right to run for election in executive, legislative, and county bodies to influence law.

Able to serve at the judicial level with proper training, vetting by legislative and appointment by executive branch.








FUNCTION OF GOVERNMENT



Branch – <u>separation of powers</u> (executive, legislative, judicial); as an attempt to prevent the concentration of power in the hands of a single group of people

- Executive enforces the law;
 - examples are decree or executive order, regulations
- **Legislative** deliberative assembly with the authority to make laws for political entities such as a country or city;
 - examples primary legislation, budgets
- Judicial the system of courts that interprets and applies law in legal cases;
 - examples judicial review, implementation law






MAP OF HAWAII - STATE DISTRICTS


MAP OF HAWAII - C&C OF HONOLULU



Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death (ROD)







'Ōhi'a After ROD

WHAT: ROD is a fungal disease that is destroying native 'ōhi'a trees.
WHERE: Hawai'i Island (Big Island). Recent aerial surveys indicate that the

disease has spread to approximately 34,000 acres.

WHEN: First discovered in 2010.

WHY: 'Ōhi'a trees are important because they make up about **80% of native forests**. They are the backbone of Hawai'i's watersheds and native forests, and are critical habitats for many of Hawai'i's endemic animals.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?


HELP STOP THE SPREAD OF RAPID 'ÖHI'A DEATH TO OTHER ISLANDS!

- ✓ STOP! Do not transport from Hawai'i Island to another island, any 'ōhi'a material, as well as clothes, shoes and equipment that may be contaminated while entering the forest.
- ✓ <u>RETURN</u> Turn 'ōhi'a material in to an HDOA amnesty bin at the airport or to a state agriculture inspector, and the 'ōhi'a will be cared for and respectfully returned to the land.
- ✓ EDUCATE Family and friends. Transporting 'ōhi'a material from Hawai'i Island to another island is a violation of state law, and you may be transporting infected material and spreading the disease.

ROD EXAMPLE AT ALL POLITICAL LEVELS

- Community ground support/pressure by Native Hawaiian hula practitioners
- Community buy in from large organizations such as Merrie Monarch
- Community members working with agencies and nonprofit organizations
- State agencies lobby Federal Representatives and Senators for appropriation of monies for Federal partners
- Implementation of laws at the State Level
- = funding impactful research and implementation of best policies known at the time.
